What began in New York in 2005 with one pantry has grown into **48 permanent food pantries** and **over 120 mobile food distribution sites**, helping families from coast to coast.



But hunger in America doesn't always look like it does overseas.

For twenty years, ICNA Relief's Hunger Prevention Program has been more than a source of nourishment, it has been a doorway to dignity, stability, and change.

Here in the U.S, **hunger hides in working families and in homes just above the poverty line**, where food stamps aren't eligible

but groceries still don't stretch. It looks like childhood obesity caused by low-cost, high-calorie diets and a lack of access to nutritious, culturally appropriate, and halal food, the kind of food you'd find in our own fridges.

"Last summer, a school principal reached out and said, 'The cafeteria is closed, and these kids



are missing their only solid meal of the day. Can you bring meals, fruit, snacks, anything helps?"

That call turned into a weekly mobile pantry serving over 200 children, a door opened through compassion.

Beyond meals, the program connects families to Refugee Services, Health Clinics, In-Kind

Assistance, and Educational Programs, creating pathways toward self-reliance. We also continued our advocacy through TEFAP, bringing halal food options into the federal emergency food system.

And while international crises often pull donor attention, the hunger here at home is just

as urgent. Your support helps children eat, parents breathe easier, and communities grow stronger.

Through every pantry box and every helping hand, we're not just feeding people. We're opening Doors of Opportunity, one meal, one family, one future at a time.

...every child in that room feels the difference

A teacher once told us about a quiet student who picked up his school supplies and whispered, “Now I look like everyone else.”

That moment captures the heart of the Back2School Program, a program built on the belief that when a child feels ready, a door of opportunity opens. A doorway into belonging, confidence, and the freedom to learn without fear of being left behind.

A child’s success depends on more than what is in their backpack, though. It depends on

the adults who guide them. Many teachers in under-resourced schools are doing extraordinary work with limited tools. Through the EMPOWER Grant, educators receive materials that transform classrooms into spaces where students can engage, create, and grow. One returning teacher shared, “**My students now come in energized. They participate**



with confidence. They finally feel this space is theirs.” When a teacher is supported, every child in that room feels the difference.

Parents, too, carry the invisible burden of wanting to provide more than their circumstances allow. When families receive support at Back2School events, the pressure to choose between bills and school readiness softens.

That relief strengthens the emotional environment children depend on at home.

Together, these efforts address widening gaps in education, not only the financial ones, but the emotional and psychological divides that shape a child’s future long before a test is taken.

The Back2School Program opens

doors at the start of the school year and inside the classroom itself, ensuring that every child, regardless of circumstance, can step forward with confidence, dignity, and possibility.

Muslim Family Services' counseling program provides culturally and spiritually responsive mental health support to the Muslim American community, addressing challenges often compounded by stigma, cultural expectations, and intergenerational differences.

Clients frequently face anxiety, depression, ADHD, trauma, and family-related issues. As one counselor noted, **"The**

most common themes I see in my clients are family-related issues...even for most of my clients coming for individual therapy." Cultural and religious factors, including fear of judgment and misconceptions about therapy, often prevent families from seeking help. Differences in assimilation between parents and children can create communication gaps and generational tension. Marital strain is also common,

with couples seeking guidance to align Islamic values with modern life. Another counselor observed, **"Muslim women appear to have an increase in these challenges as it relates to their marriage and raising Muslim children in the West,"** highlighting the intersection of gender, faith, and mental health.

Culturally and spiritually responsive counseling provides critical support. Counselors



help clients feel understood and safe: "Culturally and spiritually responsive support can make a difference when people feel they are not alone and feel that they are not judged." Integrating faith-based coping strategies, such as du'a, patience (sabr), and mindfulness in prayer (khushu'), strengthens resilience and emotional well-being. Representation matters; clients trust counselors who understand

their values and traditions, creating a safe space for discussions about intergenerational differences, marriage, and gender roles.

Beyond therapy, the program promotes mental health advocacy and education within the Muslim community. By partnering with mosques, imams, and local organizations, Muslim Family Services works to reduce stigma, normalize help-seeking, and support families in navigating

life's challenges. As one counselor emphasized, culturally attuned care **"helps lessen the stigma around seeking services and normalizing them for our Muslim community."**

Through faith-informed and culturally sensitive counseling, we support individual healing, strengthen families, and empower the community to thrive emotionally, psychologically, and spiritually.

FATE Stories

A social worker reached out to us with a concern: three Muslim children had recently been placed in a Christian foster home, and she worried they might feel isolated during the holidays. She came to FATE for guidance on navigating these sensitive moments, seeking advice on how to honor the children's identity while supporting their placement.

The most tragic case: shortly before a mother experiencing domestic violence lost her life, she reached out to FATE seeking help in finding a Muslim households to transfer her children after CPS intervention.

A referral came from a mosque imam seeking support for a pregnant Muslim teenager. FATE immediately connected her with a culturally aligned foster family. Over time, the foster family chose to adopt her child, providing a loving and permanent home rooted in stability and compassion.



FATE exists to inspire and equip families and communities to step forward for the most vulnerable children in our community. While the program works closely with Muslim families to help them open their homes and provide culturally and spiritually supportive care, its mission extends beyond any single community. FATE advocates for all children in foster

care, emphasizing that every child deserves a safe, loving home and a chance to thrive

Muslim children in care often face cultural isolation, trauma, and challenges to maintaining their spiritual identity. At the same time, families who want to care for them may feel unsure how to meet these needs. FATE bridges this gap by providing

training, mentorship, community connections, and culturally informed guidance to foster parents, kinship families, and CASA volunteers who support these children every day.

Our work is deeply rooted in Islamic principles of mercy, compassion, and service. Caring for vulnerable children is considered a form of Fard Kifayah: a communal obligation, reflecting our responsibility to uplift those who cannot advocate for themselves.

“And they give food in spite of love for it to the needy, the orphan, and the captive, [saying], ‘We feed you only for the countenance of Allah. We wish not from you reward or gratitude’ – Quran 76:8-9

Through FATE, children reclaim their identity and sense of belonging, and families receive the support they need to offer homes grounded in dignity, stability, and care. By raising awareness and strengthening community partnerships, FATE opens pathways to healing and long-term stability, guided by the principles of kafalah, compassion, and collective responsibility.

Holding the Door Open

For six years, a devoted father from Mauritania lived in the U.S. alone, working tirelessly to build a foundation for his family. This year, that long-held dream became a reality. His wife

and children arrived safely in Georgia, reunited at last. The air was filled with joy as their empty apartment transformed into a home, furnished, stocked, and waiting. “You did great work for a poor man who has nothing,” he said tearfully. **“I thank God for helping my family come to contribute to this country.”**

This is just one of over 5,000

families ICNA Relief helped sustain in 2025, families who bring strength, skills, and determination to rebuild their lives despite the trauma of forced migration.

When national refugee policies took an unexpected turn this year, the work became even more urgent. But we didn’t retreat. We anchored ourselves in the



prophetic ethic of compassion and preparedness: “Tie your camel, and trust in Allah.” That meant advocating for refugee protections, raising community awareness, and committing to continuity of care regardless of external restrictions.

Our programs remained grounded in restoring dignity and building long-term stability.

From case management to ESL classes, mental health care to vocational training, every service was designed to empower, not rescue. Through culturally responsive support and strategic partnerships, families were not only welcomed but equipped to thrive. We also deepened our investment in women’s empowerment, youth education,

and client leadership—ensuring refugees were not just recipients of support but active agents in shaping their futures.

Above all, our role was to hold the door open. Refugees walked through it with courage because when one family rebuilds, a whole community is lifted.

A young, uninsured pregnant woman walked into one of our clinics unsure if her baby—and she herself, would survive the pregnancy. A routine prenatal screening revealed severe fetal anomalies, triggering an immediate, no-cost referral to maternal-fetal medicine specialists through our hospital partners. After delivery, tragedy struck again when she developed a life-threatening pulmonary embolism. Unable to afford long-term anticoagulation, she faced impossible odds, until ICNA Relief’s Health Services

(HS) intervened, ensuring uninterrupted access to lifesaving medication. Because care was connected early and followed through, her life was saved. Stories like hers define HSs’ impact.

Across our clinics and community health fairs, HS continues to deliver deeper, more comprehensive care to underserved individuals and families. Even amid staffing constraints and operational limitations, our focus has remained clear: ensure continuity of care, early intervention, and coordinated referrals so patients do not fall through the cracks.

Maternal and infant health remains a cornerstone of this work. Our clinics provide culturally responsive prenatal care that prioritizes early diagnosis, consistent monitoring, and timely access to specialty services. Mothers are supported throughout pregnancy and beyond, and infants are connected to care systems prepared to meet their needs, reducing crisis-driven outcomes and improving long-term health trajectories for families.

HS also invests in the future of healthcare by supporting and training the next generation of

providers. International medical graduates are mentored through clinical exposure, professional guidance, and interview preparation, enabling them to transition into U.S. residency programs and serve communities nationwide. This model multiplies impact far beyond a single patient encounter by strengthening the workforce itself.

In addition, Health Services hosts academic rotations for Physician Assistant, Nurse Practitioner, and resident physicians. These trainees gain hands-on experience delivering supervised care in

underserved settings while learning culturally responsive, team-based medicine. They leave better prepared for independent practice with a grounded understanding of health equity, continuity of care, and community-centered healthcare.

By investing simultaneously in patients and providers, HS creates a sustainable cycle of impact, where today’s trainees become tomorrow’s healers, expanding access to compassionate care for years to come.

Despite ongoing challenges, HS did not retreat. We refined

our approach, strengthened partnerships, and delivered with purpose. Looking ahead, we will expand Food as Medicine and pantry-based screening initiatives, transforming trusted community spaces into gateways for prevention, treatment, and hope.

Because when care is accessible, coordinated, and compassionate, lives are not only saved, they are changed.

A Safe Place to Heal, A Path to Rebuild

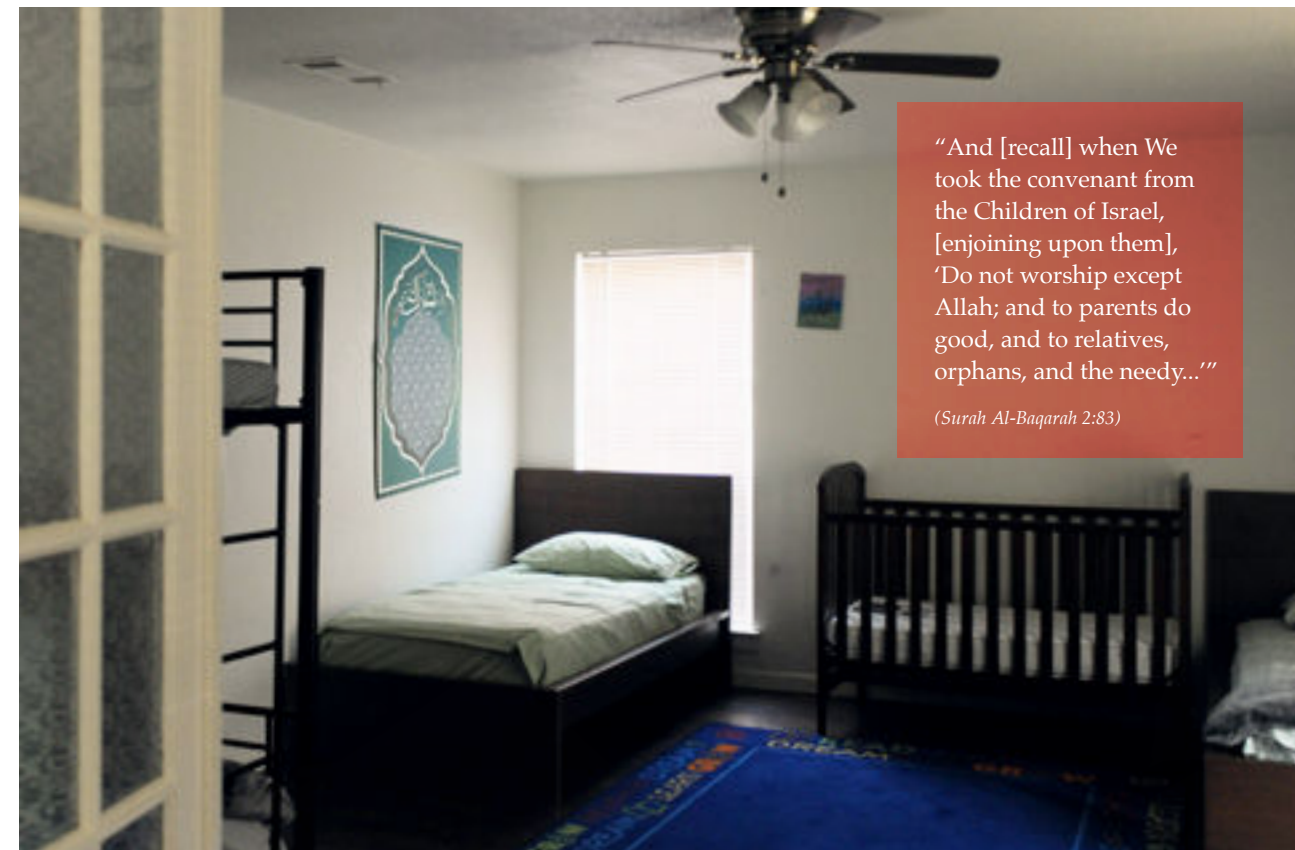
In 2025, ICNA Relief opened more than just buildings—we opened hearts, communities, and futures. With the launch of our 4th Domestic Violence Shelter and our

28th Transitional Housing facility, hundreds of women and children across the country walked through doors they once only dreamed of: doors to safety, healing, and restoration.

One such door now leads into Lula's Landing; a home donated by a sincere sister in memory of a beloved grandmother. This legacy reminds us of a promise rooted

in our faith: to protect, uplift, and walk alongside the vulnerable among us. Fulfilling the rights of the vulnerable is not optional, it is a sacred obligation and a trust between us and Allah.

Behind closed doors in our own neighborhoods, women and children suffer quietly from cultural, spiritual, and psychological abuse. Their pain is

not always visible—but it is very real. Unlike conventional shelters, ICNA Relief offers more than just a roof. We provide halal meals, culturally sensitive counseling, and the spiritual space to heal without fear. These are not extras, they are essentials. And they form the foundation of what we call a covenant of care.

Our domestic violence shelters

offer immediate protection, safety first. Transitional housing follows, with tailored services that rebuild not just a life, but a sense of self: life skills, career guidance, spiritual healing, and the peace of knowing they are not alone.

This year, our ummah honored that promise. Through homes like Lula's Landing, we turned compassion into action and

grief into legacy. It marked the third home donated in a single year, proof that the hearts of this ummah are wide open, and their promises even wider.

When a woman walks through one of our doors, she's not just stepping into shelter. She's stepping into a sacred promise, an oath of mercy, dignity, and healing.

The Disaster Relief Services Program (DRS) was established in response to Hurricane Katrina to provide timely aid and long-term support to communities affected by the disaster. Over the past two decades, the program has grown into a trusted national resource, responding to hurricanes, floods,

wildfires, and other emergencies, opening doors of opportunity for recovery and resilience.

The year began with the California Wildfires, the program's first response of its kind. ICNA Relief provided emergency supplies and support to affected communities, helping

As we celebrate 20 years, we reflect on the enduring impact of the Disaster Relief Services

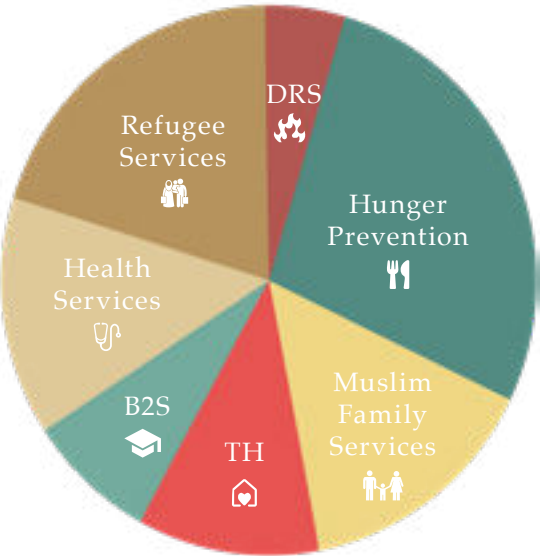
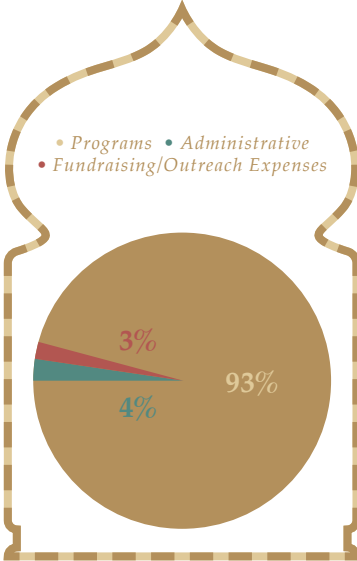
